### **COVID-19 Updates**

#### **Outdoor Mask Requirements**

Effective Friday, August 27, masks are required in most public outdoor settings, including large outdoor events, where physical distancing is not possible, and regardless of vaccination status. The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) also strongly recommends masking for outdoor gatherings at private residences when individuals from different households do not consistently maintain physical distance. The rule aligns with the exceptions outlined in the recent statewide indoor mask requirements, and does not apply to:

Children under 5 years old;

 Individuals who are actively eating, drinking, or sleeping — as well as individuals living outdoors, such as persons experiencing houselessness;

 Persons playing or practicing competitive sports, or engaged in an activity in which it is not feasible to wear a mask — such as swimming;

Individuals delivering a speech or performing
– such as with outdoor music or theater;

Mask requirements for day-to-day operations at K-12 schools are not governed by this rule, and will instead continue to fall under the school mask rule. Outside public events, spectator events, and gatherings of the general public on K-12 school grounds will be subject to the rule. Child care and youth programs will continue to follow existing OHA mask guidance; and

 In addition, entities subject to the ADA must continue to comply with that law.

### Council Appoints Mark Buzzard to City Council

At their Regular Meeting on August 10th the Donald City Council appointed Mark Buzzard to the vacancy on Council. The vacancy was first created by

Rod Scott, who resigned due to moving away from Donald, then Council appointed Jan Olsen but she resigned as well. The term expires December 31, 2024. Mark Buzzard is a tower crane operator and has lived in Donald for 16 years. He serves as a President of the Ruth Street Home Owner's Association. On his application Mr. Buzzard wrote "I have attended several council meetings and would like to become a councilor to volunteer to help make our city of Donald grow and become better for all the people who live here".

### **Community Center Open**

The Donald Community Center (DCC) is available for reservations, but with new rules. The person that reserves the DCC must enforce:

- Masks are worn during the reservation.
- People are to remain socially distant, so reservations are limited to 5 people.
- Administrating a health questionnaire.
- Following a checklist for cleaning and sanitation with the provided supplies.

lice services. Manager Bell gave a report on potential Employee Handbook changes and infrastructure costs. August 10th: Regular Meeting— The City Council had a busy meeting. To start, they voted 5-0-0 to approve Mark Buzzard filling the vacant Council seat. They heard a report from the Willamette Falls and Landing Heritage Area (website: www.wflha.org) and the Council expressed their support for the organization's work by passing a resolution. There was a second reading of an ordinance for updating the Development Code, but it did not pass. The Council wanted to reconsider allowing marijuana dispensaries in the downtown core. There is concern that if the City further restricts the location of dispensaries, it limits a potential revenue stream for the City. This matter will be reconsidered at their September 14th meeting. Under New Business, Council approved the following items:

August 17th: Special Session— the Council heard a presentation from Scott Dadson. Executive Director the Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Governments. The Council approved a contract for their service to place an interim City Manager and recruit for a permanent one.
