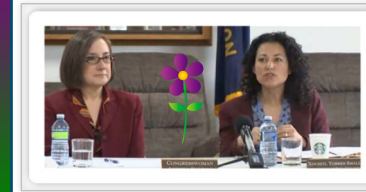

CONGRESSWOMAN ANDREA SALINAS & USDA UNDER SECRETARY XOCHITL TORRES SMALL VISIT DONALD

On April 6, 2023 Congresswoman Andrea Salinas and USDA Under Secretary Xochitl Torres Small met with local leaders at the Donald Fire Hall to better understand the needs of rural communities. Congresswoman Salinas and leaders from 18 small cities sat down with the Undersecretary of the USDA, which oversees loans, grants and technical assistance to rural residents and businesses; that



means investments in things like internet access, clean water and affordable housing in historically underserved areas. Under Secretary Torres Small said “my biggest take-away was that when it comes to supporting rural people and rural governments, it’s about providing flexibility and making it easier to access our programs. So, whether that’s investing in technical assistance, folks that would help support going through those applications or finding ways to just make the applications easier, that will help make sure we are supporting people all across rural Oregon.” *“KGW Top Stories: Noon, Thursday, April 6, 2023.”*

COMMUNITY SUCCESSES BY: CITY MANAGER, ERIC UNDERWOOD

We continue to add to the list of community successes, having much to celebrate here in Donald. The many projects that are occurring around town means exciting improvements are being made. This brings assurances of strength in our local economy and placement of critical infrastructure to safely and effectively serve our community for many years to come.

Over the past few years, Donald has been the recipient of several grants that have helped us move forward on projects such as the Blake Court Water Line Replacement project, Matthieu Street Phases I & II, New Water Well #3, and the Storm Drain Master Plan. All of which will be completed before July of this year. Earlier this year, a safety hazard to the community was eliminated by demolishing the Donald Community Center, which was collapsing from the inside.

A couple of the private projects that are in the works and worthy of our community success story include Harvest Gardens, an agricultural housing development that will soon begin construction on 49 single-family homes. The Donald Industrial Park will soon see a new speculative industrial building of just over 100,000 sq. ft. that will eventually house a new business, and create new jobs. Project updates can be viewed on the City’s website under the *Construction Projects* tab.

We have a lot to be thankful for and proud of in this community as we continue to build our resume of successes. Collective spirit, positive thinking, and a can-do attitude will certainly boost our positive momentum as we charge into the future.

APRIL 2023 CITY COUNCIL RECAP

At the regularly scheduled April 11th meeting, the Donald City Council discussed and if needed, voted on the following agenda items:

- Proclamation: Proclaimed the City of Donald is recognized by the Arbor Day Foundation as a member of the Tree City USA program and furthermore to proclaim Arbor Week in Donald from Sunday April 23, 2023 and concluding on Friday, April 28, 2023.
- Consent Agenda: Council voted 5-0-1 to accept the Consent Agenda Items.
- Old Business I: Council voted 5-1-0 to keep the Donald Community Center property and renovate it into a park.
- New Business I: Council voted 6-0-0 to appoint Cindy Johnson to the Donald Budget Committee for a term of 2-years.
- New Business III: Council voted 6-0-0 to approve the Yard Debris Cleanup event to be held on Saturday, April 22, 2023.
- New Business IV: Council voted 6-0-0 to approve the Arbor Day event and activities for April 29, 2023.

MOVING FROM DONALD?

If you're planning on moving from Donald, please contact City Hall to make arrangements to close your Water & Sewer account. If you don't, you risk being charged for additional days and/or not receiving a final bill because a forwarding address was not provided, which could result in being sent to collections.



TREE ROOTS IN SEWER SYSTEM BY: PW DIRECTOR, ALONSO LIMONES

Tree roots penetrating septic lines or tanks are generally the most expensive of sewer maintenance repairs. Once inside, tree roots will cause a total blockage of the line if immediate action isn't taken. As roots continue to grow, they expand and exert considerable pressure at cracks or joints where they have infiltrated the system. The pipe then becomes matted with grease, tissue paper and other debris causing slow flow drainage and sewer service backups. The force by the root growth will break the pipe and may result in a total collapse, which will require replacement. Property owners are responsible for the replacement costs of a sanitary sewer system as a result of tree root damage.

Homeowners should be aware of their septic tank's location and refrain from planting trees and hedges near it. Before starting any outdoor improvement project, always request utility line locates by calling 811 or submitting a request online at www.DigSafelyOregon.com.
